Summer is always time of blood shortage for area blood banks so we decided to host a Blood Drive at this year's Community Day and 24 pints were collected! Thank You to all our donors, staff and friends.

Senior Safety Initiative Reminder:

If you are or know a senior citizen (someone over the age of 65), please call us at 855-1144 and leave your name, phone # and that you would like to discuss the Senior Safety Program. We'll call you back to answer questions and set up an appointment.

What we are doing:

- Offer a free, basic "home safety inspection" and provide a comprehensive home inspection guide and safety literature to each participant.
- Offer and install as requested: free smoke detector, CO detector and long-life lithium batteries to those who are income qualified.
 Standard batteries require replacement at least once per year. Long-life lithium batteries have a 4-6 year minimum life in a smoke detector or carbon monoxide detector thereby increasing the likelihood that the detector will be working.

Fire Prevention & General Safety Bicycle Safety:

The information below is especially for children. Teens and Adults also need to wear helmets, share the road appropriately and wear reflective clothing for early morning or late day riding! And of course drivers need to be aware that bikes are on the road! The **American Academy of Pediatrics** suggests:

 Don't push your child to ride a 2-wheeled bike until they are ready, at about age 5 or 6.
 Consider the child's coordination and desire to learn to ride. Stick with coaster (foot) brakes

- until your child is older and more experienced for hand brakes.
- Buy a bike that is the right size, not one your child has to "grow into." Oversized bikes are especially dangerous. Take your child with you when you shop for the bike, so that he or she can try it out. The value of a properly fitting bike far outweighs the value of surprising your child with a new one.
- Your child needs to wear a helmet on every bike ride, no matter how short or how close to home. Many accidents happen in driveways, on sidewalks, and on bike paths, not just on streets.
 Children learn best by observing you.
 Whenever you ride, put on your helmet.
- When purchasing a helmet, look for a label or sticker that says the helmet meets the Consumer Product Safety Council (CPSC) safety standard.
- A helmet should be worn so that it is level on the head, not tipped forwards or backwards. The strap should be securely fastened, and you should not be able to move the helmet in any direction. If needed, the helmet's sizing pads can help improve the fit.

General Winter Heating Safety:

- Have a working smoke detector & carbon monoxide detector in any room with a flame heating unit.
- Never use open propane heaters as a heat source in an enclosed area.
- Never use a gas oven for heat.
- Using wood or pellets for fuel: clean and inspect your chimney <u>before</u> you light your first fire! www.health.state.ny.us/environmental/indoors/heaters/

Fireplace, Wood & Pellet Stove Safety

Sorry, we know it's still nice and warm outside, and most of you would prefer not to think about winter, but it's almost time for the fall/winter heating season. Now is the best time to start planning:

Wood and Pellet Stoves:

Find and read the instruction manual. Follow the preseason instructions. Check the seals and the damper to make sure all work properly. A bad seal will reduce the effectiveness of the stove and, more importantly, allow deadly gases including carbon monoxide into the room.

Kerosene Heaters

- Read the instruction manual <u>each year</u>, especially the safety sections and warnings. It's amazing what you forget from year to year.
- Follow the instructions for pre-use checkout.
- Fill the heater outside only and follow directions.
- Make sure your kerosene containers are well marked so that you do not accidentally refill your heater with gasoline. This can have deadly results.
- Store all kerosene outside and away from flame sources.
- Make sure you have a working smoke detector and carbon monoxide detector in any room where you have a heater.
- Keep an area of at least 5 feet clear around your heater and designate it a NO PLAY ZONE.
- Never leave children alone in a room with a kerosene heater.

Electric Heat:

Before you turn up those thermostats as the weather cools, take a few minutes to do the following to both maximize the effectiveness of the electric heat, but also to make sure it is safe:

- Make sure there are no electric wires in contact with the heating units.
- Vacuum the units. This will help eliminate that first heat odor.
- If your units have louvers, make sure they are open if you want the heat to come out!

Carbon Monoxide: The silent killer

Carbon Monoxide (CO) is a colorless, odorless gas which is a byproduct of combustion/burning. It also **kills**. As we approach the winter heating season please make sure your heating system is working properly and that you have a working Carbon Monoxide Detector. If your garage is attached, don't run your car inside! According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) **400 people die each year** from carbon monoxide poisoning and 20,000 end up in the Emergency Room.

What are the symptoms of CO poisoning?

The most common symptoms of CO poisoning are headache, dizziness, weakness, nausea, vomiting, chest pain, and confusion. High levels of CO inhalation can cause loss of consciousness and death. Unless suspected, CO poisoning can be difficult to diagnose because the symptoms mimic other illnesses. People who are sleeping or intoxicated can die from CO poisoning before ever experiencing symptoms.

How does CO poisoning work?

Red blood cells pick up CO quicker than they pick up oxygen. If there is a lot of CO in the air, the body may replace oxygen in blood with CO. This blocks oxygen from getting into the body, which can damage tissues and result in death. http://www.cdc.gov/co/faqs.htm

We'll be prepared!

Thanks to a grant from the John T. Sloper Community Fund of the Community Foundation of Dutchess County and donations from the Pawling Community, we just ordered a high tech Carbon Monoxide Detector able to detect levels of Carbon Monoxide in the blood with a simple device that fits over the finger! No more guess work. In seconds we'll be



able to know if you need to go to the hospital!
